PhD course before Photomedia Helsinki with Paul Frosh

Photographic Powers: What is the Role of Images?

This PhD course invites doctoral students to submit work to be discussed in a PhD course held one day before the Photomedia Helsinki conference (http://helsinkiphotomedia.aalto.fi).

Studies focusing on photography tend to put emphasis in analysis either 1) on particular kinds of image content, or 2) on the mechanisms that influence what is made visible or not in the first place. In both cases, understandings of relevance are articulated that give images a different role. Whereas in the first case pictures might be analysed closely, in the second scholars seem often to be less interested in images per se and focus on what happens around them. Both the 'material turn' and the 'pictorial turn' in humanities and social sciences seem to have a role here alongside more traditional modes of analysis.

Who should attend?

All interested doctoral students are invited to present their work and discuss it in relation to the role they see images to play in it. When discussing 'photographic powers', what is the role images play here?

Both empirical work and theoretical reflections are welcome, as well as work in different stages of completion.

- 5) The doctoral course is March 25, 2014 in Helsinki!
